Even though Milroy could transfer much of his Raytheon radar experience to his antenna company, starting out was tough. Timing was terrible.

The technology-based Nasdaq stock market bubble was starting to burst, resulting in ThinkKom losing millions of dollars in potential business from customers whose finances were drying up.

Now the company benefits from word of mouth in gaining customers and hiring. Coppedge said many of the people ThinkKom hires are referrals from existing employees.

About 75 percent of ThinkKom's employees call the South Bay home. The company assembles antennas, but subcontracts with other South Bay businesses for initial prototyping.

Despite its relatively small size, ThinkKom has a national profile. Entrepreneur Magazine recently named it one of the country's top fast-growth companies.

Milroy said ThinkKom might expand its products and services. For example, the company could provide broadband service for commercial customers, as opposed to just making the antennas.

With the projects and products ThinkKom has planned, as well as "incessant customer phone calls," Coppedge said the company is "going to have a big year."

"We really see 2008 as our year," Coppedge said.

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
